Greetings, fellow curlers, and fellow fans of fantastic Canadian sports championships. Hopefully you have heard that we recently announced that Greater Kingston Curling and the City of Kingston are preparing to bid on hosting the most famous and prestigious annual curling championship in the world - the Brier.

Kingston's bid to host the 2020 Brier will be submitted to Curling Canada by June 30, 2018. Revenue generation" is a very important part of the bid. Pre-sale ticket drive is an important part of this revenue generation because it indicates to Curling Canada how much committed "ticket buying" support the bid has received.

The Deposit to Buy campaign is our pre-sale ticket drive. Our bid will be greatly strengthened and have a better chance of winning with a high number - 2020 is a great target!

We are also planning to have 2020 Kingston Brier Bid forms at the five area clubs to make it as easy as possible for you to make your deposit(s).

Every \$50 you deposit is a down payment on a Full Event Ticket Package which we expect will cost about \$500. When we win the Brier bid, the \$50 will be deducted from the cost of your Full Event Ticket Package(s). If we do not win the bid (heaven forbid!) your \$50 will be refunded. If we win the bid and for some reason you choose to not purchase a Full Event Ticket Package you will forfeit your \$50 deposit.



RKCC is a hub of activity for in-house spiels this fall.



The Cataraqui Golf and Country Club is hosting (for the 19<sup>th</sup> season), the **Lefty McDonald** Seniors' Major League during the 2017 – 2018 curling season. In 2015-2016 the league was renamed to honor Lefty McDonald who convened the league for many years. A complete 11 game round robin commenced November 7<sup>th</sup> and continues to be played on Tuesday mornings at 9:30am at the Cataraqui Golf & C.C.; finishing January 23. Playoffs commence January 30 and finish on February 13. Spectators are welcome to watch these games and support your club mates.

# Curlers embody what 'sharing' is all about

For many of us, December is the season for giving, but for a small group of RKCC curlers, the giving season extends year-round. Sandy Fairbairn, Cathy Faubert, Trish Beckett, and Marianne Farrell are all volunteers at the Neighbourhood Sharing Centre, a charitable thrift shop within a stone's throw of the curling club.

Located next to Centre 70 Arena, the Neighbourhood Sharing Centre is run entirely by volunteers. The seed for the Sharing Centre was planted over 50 years ago when members Andrews-by-the-Lake United Church began to collect and distribute donated goods for families in need. Since then. the Centre has undergone several incarnations and was installed in its home at 670 Days Road,in 1976.

Sandy is the president of the volunteer board that runs the Sharing Centre, and has been a volunteer there for about 10 years, since retiring. Cathy serves as the board's secretary, and has been a volunteer for about six years, as has Trish. Together they've recruited other friends to volunteer, including Marianne.

"I like the idea of a 'sharing centre'," says Trish. "I like what it stands for."

As a young mother, Sandy bought much of her children's clothing there. "I knew that the money went back into the community." It still does. Over the years, the Centre has donated hundreds of thousands of dollars to local organizations. This year alone it has raised nearly \$50,000, which is distributed throughout the year to over 20 organizations including Martha's Table, the Partners in Mission Food Bank, Kingston Community Health Centres for support such as utilities arrears and the Kingston Dental Coalition, Humane Society, St. Vincent de Paul, Almost Home, Camp Trillium, Sandy Pines Wildlife Centre and local schools.

The Centre accepts small household wares, clothing, footwear, toys, books, seasonal decorations – everything except large furniture, for which it has no room. Donations may be dropped off from Monday to Friday, between 10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. The Centre is closed for the holidays from December 18 to January 8, and closes for the month of August as well.

Sandy describes the Centre's over 30 volunteers as a wide range of people from all walks of life, who enjoy doing their part to give back and the camaraderie of working together for a great cause. "It's a fun place to work," says Sandy. "There are a lot of nice people volunteering there. But, more importantly, she adds, "All of the proceeds go right back into the community."

# **Team Purple wins first U4 League trophy**

The new U4 League and Novice Curling trophy made its appearance after the first round robin of play at RKCC on November 6. Four colour parties competed, with team Purple emerging the colour to aspire to during the next five weeks of level two rounds, which will deadline on December 18 when the club finishes for the holiday season.

The U4 League currently has 20 members utilizing six colours representing a direct relationship to Canadian strengths in sport curriculum and opportunities to compete in club competitions: Teams Purple, Green, Red, Blue, Yellow and Orange all depict the development of the U4 League. Their development is inspired by the Town Crier Trophy (spelling is correct for the trophy purpose) and the group of curlers themselves who are learning things like control zones, communication, ice-reading, timing stones, sweeping and the delivery of a balanced slide with all of its 11 points of cadence to purposefully direct a 44-lb granite rock accurately down a sheet of ice 140 to 152 feet to out-compete an opponent for a winone game at a time.

It does sound like a great deal to accomplish, yet the coaching is always about athletic development. At the end of the day, having made new friends in partnership with Canadian curlers and organizational programs is what the U4 League is designed for. We at Royal Kingston are working with participants to set goals and to promote success in the development of their community.

As a club coach I would like to extend my curtain call posting statement in this article to appreciate the experience of working with such an enthusiastic group of curlers. Rock on in the next round robin, U4!
