An Evening of Appreciation for Rod Leeder was organized by friends and RKCC members Michael Braun and Wayne Smith and by Rod's brother Glen Leeder. The evening was not only intended as a show of support for Rod, as he battles melanoma, but as a fundraiser for Rod and his wife, Shelley Bearss, who has stepped away from her job in the past few months in order to care for Rod.

In addition to many unsolicited cash donations, friends, family and RKCC members donated items for a silent auction. Wayne Smith and the other members of his country band, The Porch Pilots, generously donated their considerable talents to the event, making for a celebratory atmosphere.

Throughout the evening, lineups formed as well-wishers waited to talk to Rod, give him a hug or a handshake and express their wishes for his well-being.

Rod's wife Shelley thanked everyone for contributing to the evening and reserved special thanks for the RKCC. "Thank you to the Royal Kingston Curling Club – you have been outstanding, from the board to the staff and all the members. Your love and support for Rod has been outstanding. And Rod's family – what a gift! Everybody has been so helpful and so supportive."

Added Rod's brother, Glen, "Our family is overcome with joy and feelings of support that the community has given us. Rod couldn't have had a better place to work for 42 years. The club has been tremendous. We really want to thank you all, thank you from the bottom of my heart."

A highlight of the evening was when Glen held up a hockey stick with a puck embedded in the blade and proclaimed it the only puck that Rod had ever stopped as a goalie. Promising that Rod would sign it for the highest bidder, he started the bidding.


At this point Rod stood up and declared, "I'm not selling it!" However, the bidding continued until it reached \$500. "Stolen!" declared Glen. "Start the car!"

Joe Jackemack, friend and longtime manager at the old club on Clergy Street, paid tribute to Rod's dedication and talent and called for a toast to Rod, for his friendship of 42 years.

Mark Potter, Rod's friend since childhood and well-known in the Kingston community as a sports broadcaster and long-serving president of the International Hockey Hall of Fame, acted as master of ceremonies and delivered a hilarious accounting of his and Rod's many (mis)adventures growing up in Portsmouth Village.

"If I had to choose one word to describe Rod, it would be 'fearless'," Potter said, recounting how Rod once contradicted NHL enforcer Dave 'The Hammer' Schultz to his face and another time had the chutzpah to ask his waitress on a date – and 35 years later, they are still together.

"Rod was a tremendous athlete, an outstanding goaltender, a very good pitcher for the Ponies and in curling, an icemaker. He has never been a guy who is afraid to decide the outcome of a game."

Potter described Rod as "old-school", a self-taught ice maker who never had any certification. And when the club decided finally that he should be certified, Potter recounted that five minutes into the five-day course, the instructor exclaimed to Rod, "You should be leading this course!"

"He is also one of the only ice makers anywhere who is certified to sharpen stones and that speaks to his ability.

"Rod genuinely cares about the club, and cares about the members, that they have good ice to play on. Even in his darkest days in the hospital, he was always concerned about what was happening at the club.

"I have never met a guy in my life who was never afraid of anything," Potter continued. "He has really demonstrated that in the last couple of years as he has fought his illness.

"Whether it's playing sports or playing poker, I've never met anybody as fearless as Rod Leeder, and that's the way he's been fighting his illness.

"He never once said, 'Why me?', he never felt sorry for himself, he's never shed a tear.

"We've been best friends for over 50 years and we've pulled hundreds and hundreds of all-nighters and I thank him for the thousands of laughs. I have very thick skin, thanks to Rod. We have shared so many great times, and I hope we'll have more in the future.

"I've never met a friend who has my back the way Rod has. Thank you for being a friend to me. Thank you for being a friend to all of us. "Keep fighting the good fight."

Sign up now for the 13th annual RKCC Golf Tournament

Join us for the 13th annual RKCC Golf Event on Thursday, June 21, 2018. Attendance is limited to only 144 spots for golf (additional spots for dinner).

This event is an important and fun fund-raising event for our curling club. The event will feature 18 holes of golf (scramble format) with plenty of prizes and the ever popular steak and salmon BBQ supper at RKCC after golf.

The cost will again be \$75 for golf with cart and dinner (\$35 for golfers who are members of the Glen Lawrence Golf Club).

We are looking to fill the event, so please make early plans and sign up at RKCC (lobby sign up sheet in place).

Also last year the prize distribution process was changed to enable an earlier conclusion to the day and this was very successful in speeding up the process.

There will be a change to the payment process this year. There were a number of late cancellations last year, which resulted in a cost to RKCC for green fee payments to The Glen as well as food costs due to non-attendees. We are instituting a pre-payment plan this year to mitigate this kind of loss.

Full payment of \$75 will be expected to be made at RKCC **no later than June 10**.

You may sign up any time during the curling season and make the payment at the bar at the time of sign-up or anytime prior to the end of curling season. Or you can sign up during curling season and pay at the manager's office at RKCC after curling season, but either way payment must be received prior to June 10 to confirm your place.



In the event of a rain out, the golf portion of the fee (\$40) will be refunded, but the dinner will still be held. If this happens, there will be social/fun day events held at RKCC during the day (more on this later).

Also, if a late cancellation is necessary (i.e., illness, unexpected situation) a request for a refund can be made to Steve Hulton, Manager, RKCC.

This year Steve Hulton and John Ryce, President of RKCC will co-chair the event, so any questions, concerns, suggestions can be made to them.

Emil Lindt inspires by example

He has been a curler for 21 years, and RKCC member for 15 and a woodworker for as long as he can remember.

Emil Lindt is a talented craftsman who built the six oak planter/room dividers in the lounge and over 15 sturdy benches, 12 of which can be found at the ends of each sheet of ice.

He built the planters in 2007, based on photographs brought back from a golfing trip by the late Betty Bush. The planters are on casters, hidden by a hinged panel. They can be easily moved for different room configurations and then locked in place. "My grandson helped me a little bit," notes Emil proudly.

The benches were made at the request of then president Roy Vasey and are the perfect size for perching on to replace a gripper, without obstructing the limited space at the end of each sheet.

Emil is always creating something in his home workshop, whether a shelf for hanging cups, bookcases, picture frames or tables, like the one he is currently making for his son.

Born in Slovakia, Emil came to Canada from Germany, to which his family had been displaced during the war, in 1952 at the age of 19. Ironically, he met his Scottish wife Mary at a German club. They had been married for more than 51 years when Mary passed away last September.

Emil started curling in Colborne, Ontario, in 1997 at the age of 65, after his son was introduced to the game. Timothy didn't stick with it, but Emil has curled almost every year since. He took a two-year hiatus after being diagnosed with chronic bronchitis in 2015, but in 2017, with his portable oxygen pack, he thought, "Why not try it?" Now he is out on the ice with his delivery stick and trusty oxygen pack two or three times a week – and on the shuffleboard court next door at Centre 70 or in Napanee just as often. He missed the game and the camaraderie and the competition as well. He can name all of the bonspiels in which his teams have come out on top (most often with the Breen brothers) and proudly points out his name on the prestigious men's club trophy, under skip Ron Cameron.

He is most proud, however, of the beautiful planters and benches he has made for the club. But Emil's inspiring example and his determination to keep doing what he loves are as much a part of his legacy at the club as his sturdy little benches and the polished oak planters.





Try curling on grass: lawn bowling

It's my first game of the year. My first shot....crap...not hard enough, just over the hog line. Adjust . . . oops, too hard, right off the rink.

Luckily my skip and vice had better luck and with timely draws and takeouts we managed to score three on the first end and went on to win our first game! All in all, a good game; my only regret was that I did not wear my wide-brimmed hat and got too much sun on the back of my neck.

Looking for a way to continue the enjoyment of curling throughout the summer? The Kingston Lawn Bowling Club would like to invite you to our open house on Saturday, June 2, 2018 anytime between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Lawn bowling is a low-impact, social sport essentially identical to curling in the basics of the game. Players throw their shots from the hack (mat) towards the button some 21-27 meters away. The shots curl towards the button (jack) or go straight, depending on the weight thrown, using the correct turn (bias) and if they take the correct ice (grass). Teams alternate shots, with one team having the last shot or hammer. Scoring is exactly the same as curling. The team winning the end loses the hammer in the next end, but gets to determine the location of the hack and the location of the button (jack). The most interesting aspect of the end is that the button (jack) is a ball, so it moves if it is hit by shots as they are made. Imagine making a perfect draw to the button only to have the next player hit the button and push it back to where his previously long shots are now the counters!

Come out to our open house and give the game a try, or even sign up for a no-cost, no-obligation lesson from one of our coaches. Bring your spouse, your kids or even your grandkids. We all play together. There is so much more to say about this addictive summer sport.
