Big results for RKCC Little Rocks at provincial HDT Championship

While many Ontarians were watching Scott McDonald compete in the Men's Ontario Tankard, many Royal Kingston Curling Club members were anxiously awaiting the results of CurlON's 4th Annual Hit Draw Tap Championship.

Three curlers from RKCC qualified for the provincial youth skills competition, held in Elmira as part of the Ontario Men's and Women's Curling Championships. Over 850 young curlers from 51 clubs participated in qualifying rounds at their home clubs, with the top 10 from each earning the right to compete in Elmira. In the 6-8 age group, Helen Young finished with the top score overall, followed closely by club mate Noah Bedard in fourth. In the 9-10 age group, RKCC's Logan Bedard, last year's provincial winner in the 6-8 age group, placed second in the qualifying round.

In true competitiveness, Helen and Noah competed against each other for the title with a final draw to the button to determine this year's provincial Hit Draw Tap champion. How exciting is that! Noah brought home the trophy and Helen swept the RKCC statistics, being the first new curler ever to make it to the event, thus making our program even brighter for having achieved such fantastic results. We couldn't be happier for her fans, friends and family.

Continuing on in the spirit of competition was Logan Bedard; last year's Hit Draw Tap provincial winner in the 6-8 age group. While having to make a leap forward from the short competition format to the full sheet of ice in the 9-10 age group, Logan placed a very gifted fourth in the finals. Logan continues to impress us in curling and we would like to congratulate him and his family for continuing the tradition of athleticism and sport development in Kingston. Well done!


From the Ice

Change has been the essence of our mandate since the last Sweep was published. With the first half behind us and its lessons learned, we have adapted to conditions and made corrections where needed in an effort to enhance the curling experience.

After the November flood and the conditions forced upon us from an inconsistent water quality, it was decided that we reinstall the Jet Ice filtration system to provide a cleaner and more dependable source. Possibly some of you have fond memories of trying to play on ice that was beyond slippery, more than a few have painful memories. Either way, the filtration system has been installed and provides us with more consistent quality and cleanliness.

We made an imprint of the rocks over the holidays to determine their state. It was found, and later confirmed in conversation with our source that has supplied and maintained our rocks, that the running surface had become wider than normal. This is evident when rocks seem to fall at higher weights and can be straight and very fast in normal deliveries. We outlined a six-part agenda to try and bring the rocks back to an acceptable condition. The first two parts were carried out the second week in January and the second two January 19. It is a slow procedure, with part one narrowing the running surface to hold the rock's path, and part two to provide some curl before we undertook the second stage on the 19th. We have witnessed minor improvements in the performance of the rocks, but it is frustrating when you know it is temporary; the running surface wears as fast as we can narrow it. We have other options which we will implement with an ultimate goal of addressing the issue fully after the season is over. Watch for additional news as available.



I have been asked to mention (for the last time) hands and knees on the ice. No matter how many times it is mentioned, it persists. This can only lead to the conclusion that the curlers don't care. (If they didn't want the holes in the ice, they wouldn't put them there!) My final word on the subject comes at it from a different perspective, one of time and money. We estimate that we spend between six and 10 hours each week repairing damage left by careless curlers. That has a direct cost, one that affects all curlers. I'm sure that each member would rather see their hard-earned dollars going to a better cause.

Since Christmas, the most prevalent complaint we have received is concerned with the cleanliness of the ice. I can assure the curlers that all efforts are taken by the ice staff to ensure the ice is clean before your game starts.

We scrape the ice twice a day and sweep sheets after every game. The carpets are vacuumed each day, some days twice, and we provide sticky mats in an effort to keep outside dirt from the ice shed. If we eliminate the ice maker as the source of said dirt, we are left with only one conclusion. As always we ask the curlers to check their grippers for wear. This is the single largest source of crap on the ice and is easily curable with a trip to the pro shop. Other sources include certain types of clothing as well as pulling items from pockets during a game. Grabbing a tissue or gloves from your pocket can leave lots of interesting things on the ice.

During the Whig Standard bonspiel in January, I managed to overhear one of our members relating our terrible ice conditions to a table full of visiting curlers. It was refreshing to hear the visitors mention that their experience at the event was highly satisfactory, nothing but positive. I did not linger to hear final results but did find it disheartening. We remain available for comments regarding the ice. Not hearing one does not lead us to the conclusion all is perfect but we don't assume conditions are bad. We prefer that members become part of the solution to a problem rather than part of the problem.

I will close with a reminder that only clear fluids may be taken into the ice shed. There is a growing tendency to take coffee or pop with you into the rink. This is not satisfactory. Accidents happen even to the most careful souls, most of which are out of your control. It has been a rule at the club forever, so long that we took it off the doors because it was obvious. Please don't make us hunt you down in an effort to protect the ice.

We thank you for your patience with the issues we have discussed. As always we try to keep the curlers interests in mind, everything we have done is to make our club the best place to curl in the city: a place members can be proud to belong. Enjoy your games and good curling


Members compete in OCA events

This event is an important and fun fund-raising event for our curling club. The event will feature 18 holes of golf (scramble format) with plenty of prizes and the ever popular steak and salmon BBQ supper at RKCC after golf. New this year, we will be playing a 12:30 p.m. shotgun start at Amherstview Golf Club (thank you for your ice sponsorship) and lunch will be included. The cost will be \$85 for lunch (hamburger, fries and Caesar salad), golf with cart and dinner. Current Amherstview members' cost will be discounted based on your type of membership.

We are looking to fill the event so please make early plans and sign up at RKCC (lobby sign up sheet in place). Also, a couple of years ago the prize distribution process was changed to enable an earlier conclusion to the day and this was very successful in speeding up the process.

There will be a change to the payment process this year. There were a number of late cancellations two years ago which resulted in a cost to RKCC for green fee payments, as well as food costs due to non-attendees. We are instituting a pre-payment plan this year to mitigate this kind of loss. Full payment of \$85 will be expected to be made at RKCC **no later than June 13th**. You may sign up any time during the curling season and make the payment at the bar at the time of sign up or anytime prior to the end of curling season. Or, you can sign up after the curling season and pay at the manager's office at RKCC, but either way payment must be received prior to June 13th to confirm your place.

In the event of a rain-out (hasn't happened yet), the golf/lunch portion of the fee (\$50) will be refunded, but the dinner will still be held. If this happens there will be social/fun day events held at RKCC during the day.

Also, if a late cancellation is necessary (i.e., illness, unexpected situation) a request for a refund can be made to Steve Hulton, Manager, RKCC.

This year Steve Hulton and John Ryce will once again co-chair the event, so any questions, concerns, suggestions can be make to them. We are also looking for two additional volunteers to assist with the organization of the event. We could also use some help with prize donations. We would welcome your assistance in this regard.
