The new league trophy was revealed and there was a visit from Bob and Doug McKenzie, with some handy curling tips. We have many fine curlers in the league, and most would agree that we have some of the friendliest curlers in the club playing with us. When there are only two of you on the team, one has to be sure to communicate and curl well together.

The league is shifting to a flight format for the January to April session and we will have two divisions, so that teams will regularly compete within their division. Games will be scheduled on Wednesday evenings, with the first game at 7:45 and second at 9:10 pm.

Doubles, continued from the front

Thinking about Doubles play for this season or perhaps next fall? It is not too late to sign up for this winter, and teams can be slotted into the B Division. Good to know that Doubles games are fast-paced, only six ends and each team throws five rocks. There are some unique rules with two positioned rocks in play at the start of each end, a free guard zone and with additional strategy options, the power play can be used by each team, once per game. Most teams find that there is stronger reliance on draws, taps and some hits. Doubles play can really fine-tune some of your finesse shots. This is Open Doubles, so teams can include any combination of players and we have some stick curlers who are very successful in the league. Some curlers are hesitant to try Doubles, perhaps not sure about how sweeping works when there are only two players or are there many different shots used. If you would like some on ice consultation before signing up for Doubles, please contact one of the league organizers and we can arrange a Sunday morning or perhaps Wednesday evening time, to go over the format, strategies for rock delivery, calling line and sweeping. We can help get you ready for your first Doubles game.

Hurry! Single-draw tickets for 2020 Tim Hortons Brier now on sale

KINGSTON - Single-draw tickets for the 2020 Tim Hortons Brier, including the playoffs, are now on sale, with adult tickets starting at just \$20.20, while youth tickets for those under 18 are just \$15.

But a word to the wise — tickets are already selling extremely well; there is limited availability for the opening draw on February 29, as well as the closing weekend (Friday through Sunday), so you'll need to act quickly to get the seat you want.

Here's a look at what is available:

- Tickets for Team Ontario games range from \$20.20 up to \$47.25 for Draw 1, which features Team
 Ontario versus defending champion Team Canada (Kevin Koe of Calgary). As an added bonus
 Team Canada will be on the ice each and every time Ontario plays during the preliminary round.
- Non-Ontario/Canada games range from \$20.20 to \$35 depending on date and time.
- Thursday Championship Pool draws are \$35 and Friday draws are \$39.75.
- Saturday Page Playoff games are \$47.25, Sunday's semi-final is \$35 and the Championship Final on Sunday is \$59.75.

Other options include day packages starting at \$59, the opening weekend package for \$119, and the championship weekend package at \$249. Club Seat full-event packages also remain available. Due to high demand, regular full event ticket packages are no longer available.

All prices (other than the youth tickets) are subject to standard facility and ticket service fees.

All ticket packages are subject to standard facility and ticket service fees, and will be available online through Ticketmaster, at the Leon's Centre box office, curling.ca/tickets or 1-855-985-5000.

The home team for the 2020 Tim Hortons Brier will be crowned at the Ontario Tankard, which concludes on February. 2.

Opponents for Team Ontario, as well as the two preliminary round-robin pools, won't be known until the list of provincial/territorial champions is complete following provincial/territorial play-downs that are now underway.

The 2020 Tim Hortons Brier will kick off with the Wild Card Game on February 28, featuring the top two teams on the Canadian Team Ranking System that didn't qualify through their play-downs.

In addition to being a part of the world's most famous national curling championship inside the Leon's Centre, you can also be part of what will be Ontario's best curling party, the World Famous Patch — just a short walk directly across the street from the arena. You can check out live music, have a meal and mingle with players and fellow fans from all over Canada.

From the Ice

It's time once again to put pen to paper (figuratively of course, even I can't read my writing). We hope that everyone enjoyed the Christmas break. For us it was a time to remedy a number of issues that adversely affected ice conditions, allowing us to get things back in order. We removed a significant portion of the dirt-embedded surface and replaced it with a nice clean one, working tirelessly to remedy flaws from the first few months. I had underestimated the drag that the newly-honed rocks would have on the ice, which left the surface uneven and scored by imperfections. Our flood has put us back to square one and we will more closely monitor the ice surface, becoming in working more proactive imperfections. If you believe a sheet is not behaving properly, please let us know so we check can for issues during dailv maintenance.

In keeping with a New Year's resolution to be more positive, I will not be mentioning dirt or bad grippers. Does that denote a fail since I just mentioned it? Just know that the local kids have managed to build a skateboard park out back where we dump the snow from our scrapes. It appears that the rubber and lint contained therein makes for a good surface.

We have witnessed a number of fairly serious falls over the past few months. These are not the result of slippery conditions as much as over-confidence of people on the ice. We have seen people trip over hacks, rocks and their own feet. Please be careful out there. Remember at all times where you are. It is ice! There is no forgiveness to a slip or a trip and you will find the landing most unpleasant.

Team Kosovo competes at World Mixed Doubles Qualification Event

Former RKCC member Peter Andersen and his teammate Eldena Dakaj achieved their first win in mixed doubles on the world stage at the World Mixed Doubles Qualification Event held at Greenacres Curling Club near Glasgow, Scotland in December (https://worldcurling.org/events/wmdqe2019/). Twenty-eight teams competed for four spots at the 2020 world mixed doubles. Teams from Germany, Italy, China and Korea will join teams from the countries who ranked in the top 16 at the 2019 World's in Kelowna in April 2020. Team Kosovo was ranked ninth on the Last Rock Draw Shot Challenge with an average of 56.57 cm (distance to the pin), better than some playoff teams. Their seven-team group was tough, including two of the winners - Germany and China. Kosovo's win came in their last game, beating Team Wales 11-3 in seven ends.

Prior to the competition Peter, Eldena and coach RKCC member Judy Russell did some training in Stirling and Perth, getting extra help from David Jones of Scottish Curling. During one session at the National Curling Academy in Perth, Eve Muirhead's team was training on the next sheet. While Team Kosovo competed in Glasgow, they were gaining some renown amongst travellers on Norwegian airlines. The December issue of their inflight magazine, N by Norwegian, features an article on Peter's efforts to get curling going in Kosovo. 
The spiel was won by the RKCC team of Celia Russell, Liz Baer, Mary Buchanan and Trish Beckett.
