# Evening Ladies changes flight format; seeks volunteers for executive

Hello Ladies:

Thank you for your patience this year while we worked to maintain the required protocols during this pandemic. We were fortunate to be able to curl at all!

Unfortunately, we had to end the 2020-2021 curling season abruptly due to COVID-19. It also caused us to miss Championship Weekend, April 16-17, 2021. However, we were able to conduct our EL Spring General Meeting on Monday, March 29. All teams played six ends that evening. Two motions were passed at the meeting: 1) MOTION to Change Flight Format for 2021-2022 to a full round robin of all teams; following that, teams would be placed in divisions for the rest of the year and playoffs; reverting back to Full Round Robin in the Fall. 2) MOTION to award no prizes for the EL Flight and Club finalists and winners for 2020/2021 curling season. The Curling Committee is currently discussing options regarding the best way to end the season.

The following Slate of Officers was voted in at the Spring AGM: Past Chair – Gail Irving; Chair – vacant; Vice Chair – vacant; EL Flight – Karen Matheson; EL Flight Co-convenor – Carol Fitzpatrick; EL Club – Andrea Berry; EL Club Co-convenor – Liz Baer; Secretary – vacant; Social – vacant; Social Co-convenor – vacant. I want to thank the EL Executive volunteers for making sure that the leagues have run efficiently during COVID-19 and for all their hard work. We sincerely appreciate your contributions to the success of EL curling.

The Evening Ladies Flight League has, for the most part, had a good season this year despite the challenges that COVID-19 has placed upon us. We maintained a compliment of 17 teams in 2 divisions. The second round robin by division was scheduled to conclude on April 12th. Unfortunately, we were unable to complete the second round due to the lockdown. 

In order to show empathy with our sponsors whose businesses are struggling, and in consideration of the reality of two shortened seasons, we offered a 25 per cent discount for the 2020-21 season. This strategy worked well, as we only lost three Wall Sign sponsors for a 94 per cent retention. ## First year at RKCC 'memorable'

Hello, everybody:

Thank you for making me feel so welcome at the RKCC. Your support throughout the year has been much appreciated. The well thought out layout of your ice area, much better than adequate refrigeration plant and new, state of the art resurfacing machine have all contributed to making work on the ice a pleasure. An excellent set of stones helps immensely in making the ice crew's efforts look good.

For those curious about what sort of maintenance was undertaken on rocks and ice this season, I can tell you that the rocks were sandpapered, fairly aggressively, only once, prior to being put on the ice for the first time. The ice was allowed to melt in a "controlled" fashion (by turning off the plant and turning up the heat) in early November and again over Christmas. After melting for about six hours the ice is, of course, refrozen and then scraped to remove all the dirt that comes to the surface during this process. Besides removing dirt, melting helps to level the ice surface and replaces excessive flooding. A hazard of this method is possible damage to the paint job and some did in fact occur, especially in the red paint. To remedy this, next season we will apply the coloured paint a little thicker. It was great working with Steve, Paul, Gene and Gisele and I'm grateful to all curlers, staff and board members for making my first year at RKCC a memorable one.

An especial thanks to the generous contributors to the ice crew's Christmas fund: that was totally unexpected and very gratefully received! Have a great summer! Hope to see you all next season!

## Daytime Doubles:

## A successful pilot project

This pilot project came together in January 2021, in response to lower curler participation in the Monday Senior Men's Flight league, which opened up a window of available ice time. The project included curling on Monday afternoons from 2:30 to 3:45 p.m. for six ends, with online website event registration format and it was open to all club members.

The Daytime Doubles curling was held every Monday afternoon from February 15 to April 3, 2021, when the curling season ended early.

We had 10 - 12 curlers register every week, and they all became familiar with the event registration format on the website. The league met the safety protocols for COVID with online screening and maintaining a record for contact tracing. There were some curlers who had to cancel after registering and there were some challenges with logistics if there is an irregular number. However, all the Daytime Doubles curlers were patient and appreciated the opportunity to curl. Curlers noted the flexibility of registering per week, as their personal schedules might change from week to week.

An initial brief orientation to the Doubles format and rules was provided and on-ice coaching or rules clarification continued to be available. Curlers were matched up with a requested teammate, or efforts were made to mix up team composition for variety and to meet new curling mates. Points were scored and recorded, but there was no record kept for win/loss records.

In March 2021, an online survey was sent to all curlers who had registered for Daytime Doubles. Although a small sample (14), all were positive about the league and 75 per cent said that they would plan to curl at least three times per month in Daytime Doubles, if it was offered in the future. Several curlers indicated an interest in registering next season for the Wednesday evening Doubles league.

Asked to respond to "The part that I enjoyed most about Daytime Doubles was?", curlers responded:

- Draw practice and a chance to try the game
- Great way to practice and meet new curlers (first year member to RKCC)
- Getting in a game without having to find a team
- Improving my draw weight and having only six ends made it possible to still curl on Monday evening
- I look forward to and enjoy Daytime Doubles
- Meeting new people and something to do in the daytime
- No pressure
- The format, great opportunity to practice delicate shots
- Participate in strategy, good fun
- No pressure, meeting and playing with new people, really enjoyable, not too big a commitment
- Opportunity to practice and improve my draw weight in a game situation. I joined Daytime Doubles to improve my consistency and it has really helped. Thanks for this opportunity.

The Daytime Doubles pilot project was successful particularly during a time of change and uncertainty. Going forward, Doubles curling provides an excellent opportunity to skilfully market the sport to current and potential members.

Thinking about Doubles in the 2021–22 season? Here are some points to consider if we are able to go ahead with Daytime Doubles:

- ✓ It is a shorter time frame with six-end games (less that two hours), fast-paced and enjoyable. There is opportunity to participate in strategy and different shot making.
- ✓ Meet new curlers.
- ✓ Stick curlers are welcome and enjoy the format.
- ✓ Given the shift to on line work from home, there can be more opportunity for some curlers to participate during daytime Doubles if offered in the future.
- ✓ Informal coaching can be provided so that curlers increase their comfort with the Doubles rules.
- ✓ Doubles curlers are the friendliest curlers in the club you have to be, it is a small team and good teamwork makes for fun and success.

Have a great summer everyone and we'll see you next year.



RKCC's social media following grew exponentially during 2020-21, fueled by an on-again, off-again season where members, those who took the year off and our fans sought to stay engaged and informed about all things curling, inside and outside the club. Posts Facebook, Instagram Twitter covered a range of topics, including members' accomplishments, club activities and information, Covid-19 safety updates and upcoming summer activities.



## Top post of the season

The combo of canines and curling continued to draw viewers' attention. On November 13, 2020, the Kingston 4 Paws Service Dogs' visit to the club to practise their skills handling noise and distraction was the top post on RKCC's Facebook, Instagram and Twitter accounts and continues to be the most viewed. On Facebook, 32,343 people have seen the post, an increase of nearly 1,000 views since last November, with 1,783 engagements, including 67 shares. The puppies' follow-up visit on December 2 recorded the second-highest engagement with 4,234 impressions, 570 engagements, 37 likes and 11 shares. Clearly canines and curling are a winning combination!

# Youth coaches deliver productive program in pandemic season

Interestingly, I bring this topic of Canadian curling to conclude our 2021 curling season at RKCC during a province-wide lockdown, knowing intuitively that we will overcome this pandemic and be a stronger nation for it. That is what RKCC and its team of Youth Coaches have embraced in order to plan and deliver a productive curling program to our community that is also a well-respected investment into our future. So how did we enter the Covid-19 assignment this year?

We did this first by enlisting some of the greatest volunteers that our community could muster prior to our actual club registration in September.

Participants came from municipal offices, Queen's University, Royal Military College, and undergraduates from larger centres in Ontario. Since our Youth League, in pre-Covid timelines, was growing fast, we had to recruit dedicated coaches for these numbers in tandem with the volunteer training of its participants. We then had to reach out to competitive curlers who were not able to use their capacity to compete in events, to coach the returning and new curlers for this Covid-19 year. It was a strategy best suited for the times.

Although the background research into the safety aspect was a task larger than what our group could afford to be engaged in, the reality of the sport to continue in our facility was the creation of the Return to Play task force. Although not a trademarked clinic per se, it was nonetheless an ingenious effort of the RKCC Board and operational curlers to provide the research and guidelines to engage our game and remain as social distancers when entering and exiting the ice shed.

The history of RKCC is renowned for its strong organizational performance and loyalty to the club logo. The club and its related members strongly support our Youth League with funds provided from Greater Kingston Curling, as well as parents. We were also fortunate enough to tap into the resources of a communications volunteer from Queen's University to provide weekly updates to all parents letting them know what was happening and how it was going to work. This provided an intimate amount of trust in our intents as coaches while also providing the proper legal and ethical certification required to initiate the program for this year. We maintained a steady emphasis on the four-person team with six ends played to end a game, knowing that the points system would accumulate to an end of season competition.

There were also some related changes on the focus of training the league for higher performance competitive strategy. This meant that we had to upscale the credentials of the coaches to meet this next layer of athlete retention. We also had to advance the management of our training aids. Thus, the refinement of our participants forming their own teams led them to seek opportunities to advance in other leagues before even graduating from our Youth Program. The Men's League provided inclusion to two teams this year, while the Ladies League welcomed spares to support its evening members.

Providing a well balanced, educated and dedicated group of coaches and volunteers has increased the spiritual goal of growing the sport of curling in our community. I see this as the most important critical role that this club can provide to experience excellence in sport training. Our coaches had clear goals and took the Covid-19 threat as an opportunity to solidify our placement in small town sport involvement. We are a close-knit community in the mosaic network of small Canadian towns and cities.

In the online symposium 'Adapting, Thriving – Focusing on the Future', hosted by the Ontario Curling Council in March, Andrea Ronnenbeck and Jennifer Ferris said it best: Ultimately individual success is based on resilience. We must create the environment and allow the vision of our youth to continue to grow with resilient energy and attitude to guide them through the formality of Long Term Athletic Development. Once you have adapted to the talent of mastering a sport from an highly trainable participation rate, the obstacle of Covid-19 will be like a drop in the ocean.
