OTF grant breathes new life into RKCC

RKCC officially welcomed the start of the 2023-2023 season on September 22, when the Golf Tour Committee and the Social Committee organized a Welcome Back BBQ for members.

The occasion was also a chance to formally thank the Ontario Trillium Foundation for its \$60,700 Resilient Communities Fund grant. Although invited guest Ted Hsu, MPP for Kingston and the Islands, could not be present, he did provide the following comments, which were read out by RKCC president Murray Matheson:

"The Royal Kingston Curling Club is a valuable and long-standing staple of our community. As the second oldest curling facility in Canada, it has been providing Kingston and the surrounding areas with top-quality curling services for over 200 years.

"Of special note is the club's strong commitment to accessibility, which makes it particularly deserving of recognition. By ensuring that its services can be enjoyed by people of all abilities, the Royal Curling Club has done much to expand the curling community in Kingston.

Congratulations once again on receiving this grant, and I hope it will help you to continue your great work for another 200 years!"

Murray noted that the OTF grant, which was awarded last fall, is for installing air tempering in the existing air handling system of the ice shed. This will reduce the temperature and humidity and improve the air quality. Summer activities will be more enjoyable and this will lead to increased use and revenues.

"We're very happy to tell you that the installation has just been completed just this afternoon," announced Murray. "This will allow us more use of the facility for indoor fitness opportunities and expanded year-round use by the community."

Murray recognized the Grant Committee, "whose many hours of work have led to our successfully receiving this grant and putting the system in place": Deb Wilkin (chair), Gord Greer, Brian Ward, Rob Campbell, Deb Hill and Communications Chair, Martha Tanner.

"In addition to the installation of a new air tempering unit by the HVAC contractor Modern Niagara, this project involved many hours of volunteer labour by members of our Operations Committee, which acted as Project Manager and installed all the insulation on the air ducts into the ice shed. This kept costs as low as possible," continued Murray. "Please help me recognize the hours work by the Operations Committee, chaired by Gord Greer, Reg Gore, Wayne Smith, Cam Gruer and Mike Braun. "The impact of this grant cannot be underestimated. Our facility is used by a variety of community groups of all ages – for sport and social events, summer camps, meetings, celebrations and fundraisers – and the upgrades will ensure more use and a healthier environment for all.

"Pickleball, beach volleyball and facility rentals contributed roughly \$45,000 in revenue to the club this summer," Murray said, "and we expect that revenue will increase again next summer.

So please join me in thanking the volunteers who keep our summer pickleball program running: Denis Faubert, Kevin Pereira, Tish LaVallee, Bonnie Arlt, Barry Malmstrom, Brian Ward, Deb Wilkin."
