Team Herron makes RKCC, Ontario proud

KINGSTON – It was a wild ride for a team only a month into the season: first, a nail-biting extra-end win at the provincial men's club championship on October 29, then three weeks later, a live-streamed game on the national stage in Draw 1 of the Everest Canadian Curling Club Championships in Winnipeg. The team, skipped by Noel Herron, with vice Steve Lodge, second Jason Boyce, lead Chris Barkley and fifth Jarryd Herron (Noel's son), played strong in the round robin with four one-sided wins and two close losses, their first to eventual gold medalist Team Sherrard from Alberta and the second to Nova Scotia, which eventually lost the bronze medal game to Manitoba.

In the championship round, the team lost their first semi-final to Team Anderson from Manitoba and moved to the B-event semi-final where they battled to a 5-6 extra end loss to Team Maheux from Quebec. You can watch game replays at plus.curling.ca.

Fourteen of the country's best men's and women's teams competed in the Everest for the right to be Canadian champions and to compete at the 2024 PointsBet Invitational. The Canadian Curling Club Championships was created in 2009 for true club-based teams and to support the development of grassroots curling across Canada.

Competing at such a high level was a bit of a throwback for Noel who won the 1990 Canadian junior men's championship, and a silver medal a year later at the World Junior Championships.

The winner of this year's Everest Canadian Men's Curling Championship, Dan Sherrard, made history by becoming the only three-time winner of the event, having won in 2012 and 2013 along with his vice Brandon Klassen.

There was a new entry from the Ottawa Curling Club, which was great to see. And most satisfying was seeing how many teams were "hybrid", that is, having players from more than one club. In a few cases RKCC lent a spare to an outside team that was short a player, but there were five teams that were hybrid "by choice". Love it! The winner this year was a true hybrid team, with the back end consisting of Terry Zarichny and Sean Meleshchuk from Cataraqui, and the front end consisting of Tyler Rider and Frank Pinder from RKCC. They had won the early draw. Larry Waller's team from RKCC won the late draw and finished just a point behind Terry's team.

Second-place finishes came from Garth Mitchell and Tony Bush, both from RKCC, and finishing in third-place in the two draws were Ron Edgeley of Brockville and Dan Lemieux from RKCC.

Due to the impact of inflation on their budget, our long-time sponsor Conservatory Pond Retirement Residence was not able to play as large a role as in the past. They were able to provide us with a couple of gift baskets that we raffled off in our 50/50 draw and graciously provided dessert for lunch, which were greatly appreciated. And they are hoping to return to a larger sponsoring role next year. Thanks so much to our volunteers — especially to the lunch crew who did such a great job quartering chickens and serving and cleaning up.

The unusually mild and humid weather posed significant challenges to the ice crew due to condensation - but they did an amazing job. Not only was the ice playable, but despite ice conditions being less than what we are used to at RKCC, we received several comments from out-of-town teams to the effect that even with the condensation issues our ice was so much better than the ice at their own clubs ever is. Curling is full of traditions, and we try to keep them going wherever possible. One of the traditions of the Limestone is the "cork draw", where a significant cash prize goes to a team whose numbered cork is randomly drawn from the trophy. This year it was won by Vic Matthew's team from RKCC. Drinks are on Vic!

Many out-of-town teams have truly enjoyed renewing their friendship with Julie, who bartended this year as she has done for so many Limestones. We are saddened that this will be her last year helping us out. Good luck, Julie, and thanks ever so much for the huge contribution you've made to the club over the years!

Team Schneider won the morning game and Team Brock the afternoon game, leading to the showdown one week later. The Grandmaster is open to men aged 70 and over and women aged 65 and over.
