RKCC welcomes curling elite

RKCC - Royal Kingston's own championship team of Noel Herron, Steve Lodge, Jason Boyce, and Chris Barkley will lead a stellar field into competition on home ice at the 2024 Maloney + Elliott Group Men's and Women's Senior Provincial Curling Championships, March 13-17 at RKCC.

Eight men's and eight women's teams will vie for the right to represent Ontario at the 2024 Everest Canadian Senior Curling Championships in Moncton, N.B., December 2-7.

Fighting to defend their titles are four-time Ontario senior champion and 2023 Canadian and world senior champion Howard Rajala from Ottawa's Rideau Curling Club and 2023 Canadian champion Susan Froud from the Alliston Curling Club. The elite roster of skips also includes silver Olympic medallist and 2004 Brier participant Mike Harris from the Brant Curling Club in Brantford, three-time Brier contender Michael Fournier from the High Park Curling Club in Toronto, three-time Brier participant Adam Spencer representing the Guelph Curling Club and three-peat Ontario Senior Curling champion Brian Lewis from the Rideau Curling Club.

Rounding out the men's field are Jim Wilson from the Oakville Curling Club, coach of Team Epping, and Gary Grant from the Lindsay Curling Club.

The women's field includes five-time Ontario and one-time Saskatchewan champion Sherry Middaugh from the Thornhill Curling Club, Jo-Ann Rizzo from the Mississauga Golf & Country Club, whose multiple appearances at the Canadian women's curling championships include her 2024 run with Team Kerry Galusha from the Northwest Territories, 1990 Scott Tournament of Hearts winner Alison Goring representing the Gravenhurst Curling Club, Cheryl McPherson, 1990 Canadian women's champion and World bronze medalist on team Alison Goring, 2019 Ontario Curling Club champion Laurie Shields from the York Curling Club, multiple Scotties participant Cathy Auld from the Thornhill Curling Club and Jennifer Harvey from the Cornwall Curling Centre.

The senior championships are open to athletes aged 50 and over. The eight-team round robin gets underway on Wednesday, March 13, with the first games at 2:30 p.m. and the opening ceremonies at 6 p.m. at the Royal Kingston Curling Club. The competition will conclude on Sunday, March 17.

The Royal Kingston Curling Club, 130 Days Road, welcomes everyone to come out and enjoy this elite level of curling. All draws are open and admission is free.

This bonspiel is one of the few bonspiels open to all members and non-members - young and old and any gender. Having it as a mixed open means the gender distribution can be 1 and 3 or 2 and 2 in any order which allows flexibility in the team set-up. The 24-team bonspiel was full and had a modified playdown schedule. This modified playdown (Gibson format) allows 24 teams to play down based primarily on win/loss rather than points. It also allows all teams to have a minimum of four games so all teams still have a chance to make the finals going into their Saturday afternoon games.

Kingston clubs host Ontario high school curling championships March 19 - 23

Frontenac Secondary School is hosting the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations (OFSAA) curling championships March 19 – 23 in Kingston. Eighteen boys and 18 girls teams from across Ontario will compete for the title, including teams from the host school. Most of the games, including the finals, will be played at the Cataraqui Golf & Country Club, but games will also be played at Royal Kingston (Wednesday, March 20 at 8:30 a.m. and 2 p.m., and Friday, March 22 at 8:30 a.m.), Gananoque and Napanee curling clubs. Volunteers from all four clubs have been working hard behind the scenes for months to ensure that the experience is the best possible, for the athletes, coaches, and spectators.

In an interview with Jessica Foley of *Kingstonist News*, Sabena Butt Islam said that the Frontenac boys team wanted to "give back and host" after earning a spot at the 2023 OFSAA championships in North Bay and having a "wonderful experience". "It is often difficult for OFSAA to find host locations and schools for their championship. Frontenac has a history of stepping up to provide these opportunities for student athletes," she said.

Sabena, who coached the Frontenac boys team to a quarter-final finish in North Bay, noted that the boys hoped to do even better on home ice in Kingston.

The opening ceremony will take place at Cataraqui Golf & Country Club on Tuesday, March 19 from 4 p.m. until 5 p.m., followed by a dinner for athletes and team personnel only. The keynote speaker will be Dr. Richard Norman, Director of Community Futures and Innovation at Curling Canada and Director at Large for UnitedWeCurl, a non-profit organization dedicated to creating inclusive spaces in curling.
